

INDEPENDENCE DAY



India will be celebrating 75 years glorious years of its independence from British rule on August 15. India received freedom from the oppressive rule of the British Empire in 1947. For the first time, Prime Minister Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru hoisted the National Flag of Independent India above the Lahori Gate of Red Fort in Delhi and said, "At the stroke of the midnight hour, when the world sleeps, India will awake to life and freedom." The day marks the sacrifices of our brave leaders and freedom fighters who gave away their everything for the sake of their countrymen. As always, Red Fort will bear witness to the iconic celebrations of 75 years of Independence. As we commemorate the occasion, let us take a look at the history and significance of this date.

The Indian Independence Bill was introduced in the British House of Commons on July 4, 1947, and passed within 15 days. On August 15, 1947, the British rule over India ended and marked history. ADANI GROUP TO INVEST \$5.2 BILLION IN ODISHA TO SET UP ALUMINA REFINERY



Adani Enterprises Ltd. plans to invest \$5.2 billion in setting up an alumina refinery in the eastern Indian state of Odisha, as Gautam Adani, Asia's richest man, adds one more business to his rapidly-expanding empire.

The flagship company of the Adani Group got the approval to build the refinery and a captive power plant in Rayagada for an investment of 416.53 billion rupees (\$5.2 billion), according to a Twitter post on Wednesday by the office of the state's Chief Minister, Naveen Patnaik. Adani had scaled up his nascent cement business overnight by acquiring Holcim Ltd.'s India units for \$10.5 billion in May, less than a year after setting up a cement subsidiary. He is now steadily building up his group's metals portfolio after announcing plans for steel and copper plants earlier in the year.

In June, Adani Enterprises raised 60.7 billion rupees in a syndicated club loan for a 500,000 tons new copper refinery complex in Gujarat. The company also announced a tie up with South Korean steel major Posco in January to explore business opportunities in India, including the setting up of a green steel mill.

FIRST FLIGHT OF INDIA'S NEWEST ROCKET, WHAT IT MEANS FOR ISRO

It was one of the most keenly-awaited launches of recent years. The maiden flight of the SSLV or the Small Satellite Launch Vehicle, India's newest addition to its rocket fleet, had been postponed several times in the last three years. The pandemic played its role, but there were delays from <u>ISRO</u>'s side as well. It is a rocket that can be assembled within 72 hours by a team of just 5-6 people. A rocket that costs at least one-tenth of the those currently in use.



A rocket that can enable a space launch from India every week. And, a rocket that caters specifically to the small and micro satellites that constitute over 90 per cent of all satellites being launched these days. There is a reason why it is considered a gamechanger, and is seen as something that can truly transform the Indian space sector.

Several new players, both in the government as well as private sector, have begun to offer launching services. In India, where the space sector is fast being opened up for the private sector, at least three private companies are developing rockets that can launch small satellites into space. It is to cater to this demand, and to grab this business opportunity, that ISRO has also developed the SSLV.

SAMUDRAYAAN MISSION: INDIA'S FIRST MANNED MISSION TO SEND HUMANS 6,000 METRES DEEP IN OCEAN

Samudrayaan Mission is aimed to develop a self-propelled manned submersible to carry three human beings to a water depth of 6,000 meters in the ocean with a suite of scientific sensors and tools for deep ocean exploration. It has an endurance of 12 hours of operational period and 96 hours in case of emergency.



Oceans, which cover 70 percent of the globe, remain a key part of our life. About 95 percent of the Deep Ocean remains unexplored. For India, with its three sides surrounded by the oceans and around 30 percent of the nation's population living in coastal areas and coastal regions play a major economic factor. It supports fisheries and aquaculture, tourism, livelihoods, and blue trade. Some of the critical subsystems of the manned submersibles are development of Ti Alloy Personnel Sphere, Human support and safety system in enclosed space, low density buoyancy modules, Ballast and Trim System. Pressure compensated batteries and propulsion system, control and communication systems and Launching and Recovery System.

EARTH'S DAYS HAVE BEEN MYSTERIOUSLY INCREASING IN LENGTH – SCIENTISTS DON'T KNOW WHY



Earth's rotation has been slowing down over millions of years due to friction effects associated with the tides driven by the Moon. That process adds about 2.3 milliseconds to the length of each day every 100 years. A few billion years ago, Earth Day was only about 19 hours.

For the past 20,000 years, another process has been working in the opposite direction, speeding up Earth's rotation. When the last ice age ended, melting polar ice sheets reduced surface pressure, and Earth's mantle started steadily moving toward the poles.

Just as ballet dancers spin faster as they bring their arms toward their body – the axis around which they spin – our planet's spin rate increases when the mass of the mantle moves closer to Earth's axis. This process has been shortening each day by about 0.6 milliseconds each century.

Over decades and longer, the connection between Earth's interior and surface comes into play too. Major earthquakes can change the length of the day, although normally by small amounts. Apart from these large-scale changes, over shorter periods weather and climate also have important impacts on Earth's rotation, causing variations in both directions.

The fortnightly and monthly tidal cycles move mass around the planet, causing changes in the length of the day by up to a millisecond in either direction. We can see tidal variations in length-of-day records over periods as long as 18.6 years. The movement of our atmosphere has a particularly strong effect, and ocean currents also play a role. Seasonal snow cover and rainfall, or groundwater extraction, alter things further.

ARE WHALE SHARKS NOW THE WORLD'S LARGEST OMNIVORE?

A new study finds that whale sharks are the biggest omnivore, disproving previous research on whale sharks' diets. Researchers were stunned when analyzing whale shark biopsy samples that contained lots of plant material as well as krill material.



Western Australia's Ningaloo Reef, whale sharks have historically been observed eating krill but this new biopsy has allowed scientists to rethink what sustains the superspecies. Dr. Mark Meekan, a fish biologist from the Australian Institue of Marine Science said, We've seen them coming to Ningaloo and we've seen them feeding on krill and we've thought, 'Boom there's the answer. But with sophisticated methods that look at the microchemistry of these animals, this story becomes much, much more complex."

The team of scientists analyzed food sources like planktons and large seaweed to find amino and fatty acids that might match what was present in the skin samples from whale sharks. The study suggested that these fish are feeding on more than just krill. Meekan noted that the whale shark's large size has prompted an evolutionary response to start to consume more than just krill. With the whale shark's large size, it's not surprising that they've started to utilize the very common brown sargassum seaweed, very common on the Australian reefs, as food. As time has moved on, whale sharks have adapted to digest seaweed and even algae that they are ingesting into their mouth.

Uncertainty about the future, stagnating salary, discrimination, burnout and frustration with bureaucracy and administration were among the key reasons that pushed academics and scientists to walk away from what they love to do.

This, it shapes a "mid-career malcontent" and pushes them to rethink their career path.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE INTERNET

The Internet started in the 1960s as a way for government researchers to share information. Computers in the '60s were large and immobile and in order to make use of information stored in any one computer, one had to either travel to the site of the computer or have magnetic computer tapes sent through the conventional postal system.

This eventually led to the formation of the ARPANET (Advanced Research Projects Agency Network), the network that ultimately evolved into what we now know as the Internet. ARPANET was a great success but membership was limited to certain academic and research organizations who had contracts with the Defense Department. In response to this, other networks were created to provide information sharing. January 1, 1983 is considered the official birthday of the Internet. Prior to this, the various computer networks did not have a standard way to communicate with each other. A new communications protocol was Transfer established called Control Protocol/Internetwork Protocol (TCP/IP). This allowed different kinds of computers on different networks to "talk" to each other. ARPANET and the Defense Data Network officially changed to the TCP/IP standard on January 1, 1983, hence the birth of the Internet.

The first UNIVAC for business applications was installed at the General Electric Appliance Division, to do payroll, in 1954. By 1957 Remington-Rand (which had purchased the Eckert-Mauchly Computer Corporation in 1950) had sold forty-six machines.

HOW DID THE EARTH AND THE MOON FORM?



The Earth, like all the other planets in the solar system, started out its life as a disc of dust and gas orbiting the young Sun. The dust particles were brought together by the forces of drag to form clumps of rock that grew into "planetesimals" tens to hundreds of miles across, and then to Mars-sized "protoplanets" by colliding with each other.

Earth grew to its final size through one last major collision with another Mars-sized object. This last collision, also known as the "moon-forming impact", was so large that—in addition to adding lots of material to the Earth—there was enough energy to vaporize some of the rock and metal from both the proto-Earth and the impacting object. This vapor formed a disc around the Earth that eventually cooled and clumped together to become the moon.


We know this thanks to rigorous studies of meteorites and rock samples, including at the University of Chicago, in the 20th and 21st centuries.

Understanding how the Earth and moon formed is important for piecing together the history of the solar system and answering questions like how long planets take to form, what planets are made of, and what makes a planet suitable for life. This also guides planetary scientists in their search for other habitable (or inhabited!) worlds in our solar system and beyond!

40 AND GOING STRONG: SHARATH KAMAL WINS CWG SINGLES GOLD AFTER 16 YEARS

Sharath Kamal showed age is just a number as the 40-year-old capped his best ever performance at the Commonwealth Games by winning the men's singles gold here on Monday.

After losing the first game that he should have closed, Sharath beat a much younger yet experienced Liam Pitchford of England 11-13, 11-7, 11-2, 11-6, 11-8 at the NEC arena.

Sharath, who had first won the singles gold back in 2006, had already claimed two golds here in the team and mixed doubles event alongside Sreeja Akula.

With this yellow metal, he increased his tally to a staggering 13 medals across five CWG appearances.

In the final, he was at his finest, firing winners from both sides. Long rallies away from the table was the order of the day and Sharath won majority of them. He was also brilliant in cutting the points short with perfectly placed backhand winners.

He thought he had converted his second match point but the umpires awarded the point to his opponent as the ball was close to Sharath's body at the time of his retrieve.

He converted the next one to complete a memorable run in Birmningham. G Sathiyan secured the bronze after a marathon battle against England's Paul Drinkhall.

Sathiyan bagged his maiden CWG singles medal after beating home-favourite Drinkhall 4-3 in front of a packed crowd.

On Sunday, Sathiyan paired up with the Sharath to claim the men's doubles silver after going down to the English duo of Drinkhall and Pitchford.

INDIA SETTLE FOR SILVER IN MEN'S HOCKEY, LOSE 0-7 TO AUSTRALIA IN FINAL

In one of its worst performances in recent times, the Indian men's hockey team suffered an embarrassing 0-7 drubbing at the hands of defending champions Australia to settle for a silver medal at the Commonwealth Games on Monday. Australia blew away India with their whirlwind speed and relentless attacks, extending their dominance of the CWG stage. Since hockey's introduction at the Games in 1998, Australia has always stood on top of the podium.

This is India's third defeat against Australia in a CWG final, having lost to them in the 2010 and the 2014 editions of the Games.

Nathan Ephraums and Tom Wickham scored a brace each while Blake Govers, Jacob Anderson, and Flynn Ogilvie also found the net in the lop-sided contest.

It was a far cry from what was expected in a gold medal clash as a dominant Australia pumped in five goals in the first half to take the game away from India. The other time India suffered such a heavy defeat in CWG was in the 2010 edition in New Delhi, where Australia hammered the hosts 8-0.

The Indians looked rusty and clueless as they conceded too much space to the Australians in the mid-field, which allowed the Kookaburras to make inroads

The structure which the Indians are known for was nowhere to be seen. The defence looked shaky, while there was no coordination between the midfield and forward-line.

An injury to Manpreet Singh after a collision with an Australian player in the second quarter made life more difficult for the Indians as the skipper didn't take the field in the last two quarters. In the 42nd minute, Ephramus scored his second goal with a neat deflection before Ogilvie added another four minutes later.
