

ZOMATO POSTS SURPRISE PROFIT IN Q2, EXPECTS MORE IN FESTIVE SEASON



Zomato posted its second straight quarterly profit today, an unexpected result that was driven by higher food delivery orders that the company expects will be even higher in the ongoing festive season.

Net profit came in at 360 million rupees in the second quarter ended September 30, beating analysts' expectations of a loss of 201.7 million rupees, according to LSEG. It had reported a loss last year.

Gross order value (GOV) - the total value of all food delivery orders placed - for the foods business grew 20%, led by higher orders and as customers with the paid "Gold" subscription used the service more frequently.

Shares ended the session 8.3% higher, taking year-to-date gains to over 96%.

GOV in the segment could grow between 25% and 30% in the third quarter ending Dec. 31, Chief Financial Officer Akshant Goyal said in a letter to shareholders.

Indians typically splurge on everything from sweets and snacks to clothing during the festive quarter, which includes Christmas and the Hindu festival of Deepavali, helping consumer-facing corporations book outsized sales growth.

Food business CEO Rakesh Ranjan said the festive period is "usually a mixed bag for the food delivery business," adding that people split their spending between ordering in and dining out.

The ongoing Cricket World Cup, which stretches between October 5 and November 19, should result in additional orders, he said, but cautioned that the demand uptick would not be significant and only limited to match days.

Demand for online food ordering has broadly grown in recent years, prompting delivery services providers such as Zomato and rival Swiggy to aggressively expand.

Zomato's revenue from operations soared over 71% to 28.48 billion rupees in the second quarter.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND THE FUTURE OF HUMANS



Digital life is augmenting human capacities and disrupting eons-old human activities. Code-driven systems have spread to more than half of the world's inhabitants in ambient information and connectivity, offering previously unimagined opportunities and unprecedented threats. As emerging algorithm-driven artificial intelligence (AI) continues to spread, will people be better off than they are today?

Some 979 technology pioneers, innovators, developers, business and policy leaders, researchers and activists answered this question in a canvassing of experts conducted in the summer of 2018.

The experts predicted networked artificial intelligence will amplify human effectiveness but also threaten human autonomy, agency and capabilities. They spoke of the wide-ranging possibilities; that computers might match or even exceed human intelligence and capabilities on tasks such as complex decision-making, reasoning and learning, sophisticated analytics and pattern recognition, visual acuity, speech recognition and language translation. They said "smart" systems in communities, in vehicles, in buildings and utilities, on farms and in business processes will save time, money and lives and offer opportunities for individuals to enjoy a more-customized future.

Many focused their optimistic remarks on health care and the many possible applications of AI in diagnosing and treating patients or helping senior citizens live fuller and healthier lives. They were also enthusiastic about AI's role in contributing to broad public-health programs built around massive amounts of data that may be captured in the coming years about everything from personal genomes to nutrition. Additionally, a number of these experts predicted that AI would abet long-anticipated changes in formal and informal education systems.

Yet, most experts, regardless of whether they are optimistic or not, expressed concerns about the long-term impact of these new tools on the essential elements of being human. All respondents in this non-scientific canvassing were asked to elaborate on why they felt AI would leave people better off or not. Many shared deep worries, and many also suggested pathways toward solutions. The main themes they sounded about threats and remedies are outlined in the accompanying table.

JWST SPOTTED A NEW SPEEDY JET STREAM IN JUPITER'S ATMOSPHERE



New beauty shots of Jupiter, captured by the James Webb Space Telescope, reveal a speedy jet stream encircling the equator at an altitude never imaged before.

Researchers have known about Jovian jet streams since Voyager spacecraft flew by in 1979. Those relatively stable winds occur near the planet's main cloud decks, in the troposphere. The newly spotted jet lies 20 to 40 kilometers above, in the stratosphere, and moves at about 500 kilometers per hour, or roughly twice as fast as the jets below, astrophysicist Ricardo Hueso and colleagues report October 19 in Nature Astronomy.We were not expecting to find these strange motions in the equatorial atmosphere," says Hueso, of the University of the Basque Country in Bilbao, Spain. There is no theory that predicts a change in the winds at this altitude on Jupiter, he says.

It's not clear yet what causes the speedy jet. "If you have very intense motions, you need energy to produce those motions," Hueso says. This energy could come from storms below the jet. It may also be linked to happenings higher in the troposphere, where scientists have observed a band where temperature and wind intensity oscillate over four or so years. Similar cycles over the equator also occur on Saturn and Earth.

Earlier observations of Jupiter hadn't been able to image this part of the stratosphere. Its altitude lies below what ground-based telescopes on Earth glimpse and above what the Hubble Space Telescope captures. But using special infrared filters, JWST was able to peek into this mysterious region.

"Here they have this missing piece of the puzzle for the first time in this latitudinal range around the equator," says Thibault Cavalié, a planetary scientist at the Laboratoire d'Astrophysique de Bordeaux in France.

The high-resolution images are "stunning," says Liming Li, a planetary scientist at the University of Houston, also not involved with the study. The researchers used two snapshots of Jupiter taken 10 hours apart. Based on how atmospheric features shifted in that time, the team clocked the stream's speed.



FREE DIGITAL STREAMING OF CRICKET WORLD CUP SHRINKS TV VIEWERSHIP



The ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2023 in India saw an 8% drop in audience reach, with 90 million viewers for the first 11 matches, compared to 98 million in the 2019 edition. The decline in traditional TV viewership is attributed to the popularity of free cricket streaming on Disney+ Hotstar. TAM Media CEO LV Krishnan noted that audiences have shifted from TV to digital streaming, with TV ratings down 13% to a 1.93 TVR for the first 11 matches.

India vs. Australia was the most-watched match with a 4.77 TVR, followed by India vs. Afghanistan with a 3.41 TVR. Disney Star, with TV and digital rights, expects ad revenue between ₹2,000 to ₹2,500 crore. The combined TV and digital viewership is anticipated to surpass the previous edition, despite fragmentation. The return of the event to India after a decade has generated significant interest. High concurrency numbers were observed for non-India matches due to increased digital reach.

EGYPT'S PYRAMIDS HOST STUNNING WORKS OF ART



On the plateau overlooking the ancient Pyramids of Giza in Egypt, a major outdoor art exhibition brings together the work of 14 international contemporary artists who have created site-specific installations responding to the iconic monuments. In one project, a new pyramid structure emerges in wicker; in another, glass sculptures appear to make the ancient pyramids float on water.

Every year we have an amazing group of artists that are in dialogue with this civilization," said Ghaffar over video call from Cairo. Art D'Égypte works with UNESCO to ensure the exhibition leaves the 4500-year-old world heritage site completely unharmed. (A 50cm layer of imported sand is used to place the artworks on, so they don't even touch the ground.) The works this year engage with the fertile territory of concepts presented by the pyramids, from mythology and spirituality to technical innovation and architecture.

Mexico City-based Argentinian artist Pilar Zeta has created "Mirror Gate", a limestone portal decorated with gold and iridescent blue spheres and topped by a pyramidal apex, under which lies a checkerboard pathway leading to a mirrored egg on a plinth. "I've always been fascinated by the Pyramids of Giza and the entire ancient Egyptian culture — the mysticism around it, the enigmas," Zeta said. "The pyramids are the most sacred sculptures on planet Earth in my opinion."

BATTLE OF PAWANKHIND



Five hours after the battle started, the cannon fire announcing Shivaji's safe return to Vishalgadh was heard. Almost three hundred Marathas had been killed. Legend has it that a gravely injured Baji Prabhu continued engaging the enemy and held the pass, only laying down his life once he heard the sound of cannon fire. The handful surviving Marathas then retreated and disappeared in the forest as per the plan.

On the other hand Shivaji and his 300 soldiers had to break through the encirclement of Suryarao and Jaswantrao at Vishalgadh. A fierce battle ensued in which Shivaji himself fought wearing Dandpatta in his both hands. Seeing this fight, the commander of Vishalgadh fort sent help to Shivaji enabling him and his troops to reach the fort safely. Shivaji then fired cannons as a signal for Baji Prabhu to retreat. Shivaji's plan was successful. Having made his way to Vishalgadh, Rango Narayan Orpe had fresh troops at his disposal. Baji Prabhu had successfully fought the rearguard action and slowed the Adilshahis forces before they arrived at the fort having carried on pursuing

Shivaji to Vishalgadh. The vengeful fresh Maratha troops carried out a blazing and bloody attack against Siddi Masood, Jasawantaro and Suryarao's forces inflicting heavy losses upon the latter when they arrived at the fort. The Adilshahi forces fled as a result of this attack. verification needed]One Maratha chronicler describes this fierce attack by mentioning that the 'green valleys of Vishalgadh were painted in red due to enemy's blood'. Shivaji then safely crossed the western ghats and reached his capital Rajgad via Konkan region.

Shivaji later personally visited the house of the slain Baji Prabhu, which was in the village of Kasabe Sindh in the Raigad district and honoured his family, including giving his eldest son a position of leadership and honour in the forces. The last stand, battle of Ghod Khind (Eng: Ghod pass) by about 300 Marathas led by the Baji Prabhu Deshpande was renamed "The Battle of Pavan Khind" which in Marathi means "The Battle of the Sacred Pass".

In his collection, there are approximately 4,000 pens, encompassing a variety of brands, spanning from Reynolds to the high-end Waterman pens.

Originating from Nayagarh district, Tushar Das mentioned that back in 1992, he used to write with a Reynolds pen. Now his pen collection includes pens worth Rs 5,000 and more.

Das said that his unconditional love for pens started with the Parker pen.

"When I was studying in class X started collecting pens from my friends. I used to write with Reynolds ball pens, which were very popular from 1992 to 2005. Later, I started using different pens to write down and became a pen lover," he said.

"I have over 4,000 pens with different brands, like Cross, Oliver, Waterman and other brands. Some of them are from different countries like America, Japan, and Germany starting price of Rs 5 to Rs 5,000. I have a collection of few pens, which are gold plated and very expensive too," Das added.

Tushar Kanta Das now aspires to amass a collection of 10,000 pens by the upcoming Fountain Pen Day, which is celebrated on the first Friday of November each year.

Pyongyang hotel. At the time of his arrest, Warmbier was traveling with China-based tour operator Young Pioneer Tours (YPT) on a five-day tour of North Korea. He was later released and returned to the U.S. in a coma, which led to his death on 19 June 2017

The government is supposed to monitor the import of hazardous waste which enters India through a gap in the law that allows the import of waste for recycling. Most of the ports in India do not have radiation scanning technology. Workers processing hazardous waste use their eyes to tell the difference. Most of the waste enters through ports of Mumbai, Chennai, Calcutta, Cochin and Visakhapatnam.

Waste comes to distribution centres like West Delhi's Mundka and Mumbai's Dharavi before being taken away by different agents to specialty processing markets like Seelampur in Delhi. Agents sell the components to others who sell them to factories. The finished recycled products, much cheaper than their branded counterparts, are sold in the wholesale markets.

In New Delhi Seelampur is the biggest market for second hand electronic parts. But most of the shops here are not registered as legal recyclers which have deterred the entry of legal recyclers. The informal sector gets 95% of the business as they do not pay the cost to meet the environment norms. When a court order shut down all plastics burning in Seelampur five years ago, the industry merely shifted 8 kms away.

India has a capacity to handle just 30% of its domestic waste. India's capacity to treat hazardous waste is not growing at the same pace as waste generations. Although recycling industries are temporarily profitable; the damage to the environment is often permanent. Near Moradabad, the waters of the once –fertile Ramganga river have turned black with plastic ash. With no government control and little regard for the environment, the private waste-processing industry poses a threat to public safety in India.

This in turn pleased Lord Shiva who then appeared before Nar and Narayana and asked them to seek for a gift. Nar and Narayana then requested Lord Shiva to permanently reside as a Jyotirlingam at Kedarnath, so that the people who come to worship Lord Shiva here won't be enslaved to their miseries in life anymore.

Legends of Kedarnath Creation the Kedarnath dates back to the Mahabharata which states that when the Pandavas came to seek the blessings of Lord Shiva to free themselves from the sin of killing their cousins. Lord Shiva disguised himself as a humped buffalo and hid himself at Kashi, then known as Guptkashi. The Pandavas eventually managed to discover Lord Shiva who was hiding beneath the ground with his hump in the ground and this impressed Lord Shiva then.

Therefore the Bhiaronath Temple is visited ceremoniously at the opening and closing of Kedarnath. Significance of the Kedarnath Jyotirlingam the Lingam at Kedarnath is one amongst the 12 Jyotilings of Lord Shiva. It is said to have blessed the Himalayas and keeps them soaked with the godliness of Lord

Shiva. 

Bheema got hold of it and that is how Lord Shiva blessed them.
